

What Does Global Economy Looks Like?

- Increase use of technology
 - Beyond new equipment and faster communications
- Technology changed the management of workplace:
 - Telecommunications expand flexibility in workplace
 - Increase efficiency and effectiveness in job tasks
 - Use for effective presentations for clients/employers
 - Computer programs constantly upgrade



What Does Global Economy Looks Like?

- Assistive technology has opened new opportunities for people with disabilities.
- Information service reflects:
 - Bridge between business world and computer science
 - Store larger data – use in most industries
- All developed countries—our competitors—have made this shift to information products and services.

What Does Global Economy Looks Like?

- Increase diversity in workplaces
 - More immigrants, women, disabled in the workforce, former incarcerated
- Decentralized organizations
 - Decision-making participation of employees in every level.
- Employers will have higher expectations for job skill requirements/tasks

What Does Global Economy Looks Like?

- Globalization
 - The world is smaller
 - Companies and professionals collaborate with partners overseas
 - Teleconferencing allows meetings to occur while saving traveling expense
 - Skype, Phone conference
 - Must understand different culture and languages




What Does Global Economy Looks Like

Global Economy Impact Communities

- Expansion of chain businesses

Global Economy Impact Communities

- Turnover Rate

How Will Global Economy Impact Careers

- Lifelong Learning Programs:
 - Provide workshops
 - Pay for employees to attend conferences
 - Offer tuition reimbursement
 - Other training programs
- Align services and products with the needs of the global economy
 - Remain competitive in the global economy
 - Reflect the type of skills that employers seek

 - Monitoring development proposals in inner cities
